


LEGION MEMBERSHIP

Please let me know if there is some service that our Post or at the Department level can provide for you or if there is any reason that has kept you from renewing your Membership.



As state Chaplain, February 2, 2020 I officiated the 4 Chaplains' ceremony at the Cathedral of The Air.

On February 3, 2020 I attended a Q.P.R. suicide prevention seminar at OCC.

I attended a meeting of our Victory Garden Committee, always looking for help, stay tuned for volunteer opportunities.

I attended the Departments D.E.C. meeting in Trenton. Attended a meeting of the veterans sub-committee of the Ocean County Military Support Commission.

I attended the Base Commanders Meet and Greet at Laurita Winery.

I participated in the installation of a POW/MIA chair in the Ocean County College Library.

I had meetings with the Ocean County College Veterans staff and went over benefits and programs available to their student population, including disabled parking pass, possible township property tax breaks and the \$6000 tax exemption for New Jersey Veterans.

I made a number of hospital and nursing home visits and I would love to do more, but unless I am told about a brother or sister that may be hospitalized or in a nursing home, I can't make that happen. 

RESILIENCE AND AGEING

Life may not come with a map, but everyone will experience twists and turns from everyday challenges to traumatic events with more lasting impact, like war, the death of a loved one, a lifealtering accident or a serious illness. Psychologist defines resilience as the process of adapting well in the face of adversity, trauma, tragedy or significant sources of stress.

Unfortunately, for most people, the only way to build up resilience is to experience trauma and loss for themselves. To quote Elizabeth Hardwick, "Adversity is a great teacher, but this teacher makes up pay dearly for its instruction; and often the profit we derive, is not worth the price we paid."

I am not a Psychologist or even a therapist but I do see that many of the members of our Post can be categorized as being in the age bracket from 65 to 85 years old. Based on the explanation above many would think that the ageing population should be highly resilient but unfortunately that may not be true. While studies continue to be conducted on the resilience of the age group, there are many intervening factors that suggest differently.

Adaptive coping styles are critical to older adults' capacity to recover from stressful events and as we age the number of stressful events we encounter grows. Happiness, lack of cognitive failures, good mental health, optimism and hopefulness all factor into the strength of resiliency. On the

social side of resilience, community involvement, contact with family and friends, sense of purpose, social support and connectedness are all a major part of being a highly resilient person.

As you may imagine, removing some of the characteristics of resilience, like the loss of mobility, isolation or the lack of connectedness, the death of a loved one and the loss of hope can easily whittle down ones resilience.

Our Post has the resources to identify and to counter some of the effects of the low resilience in our aged membership. We just have to be aware and reach out with compassion.

Michael Schaffer and I ask you to be aware of those who may fit into the category of isolation and hopelessness and reach out to us. Sometimes just a phone call to say hello and tell them that someone cares is all that it takes to make day.
