THE ETHICS CHECK

Dealing with the topic of ethics is like untangling a fishing line. The more you get into it the more complicated it becomes. In today's rapidly-changing society, do you wonder what it means to make honest decisions and hold yourself and others accountable in your personal, professional and family lives?

Navigating through the moral mud can be difficult with the many different individual religious, legal and moral standards we have to contend with at our Post. The job of defining what is ethical in each situation that arises can be monumental.

My hope is that the following tool will help better sort out ethical issues within our Post and your personal life as well. Additionally, this tool may help guide you to adopt a personal Code of Ethics and Standards of Conduct. Trustworthiness is not a destination it's a way of life. When it comes to honesty, we really only have two choices. Situational ethics that treat some more fairly than others or ethics that treat everyone fairly without question.

Many people contend that nowadays there is a big gray area between right and wrong, and they use the gray area as an excuse to practice situational ethics. I do not agree with that logic. It is too easy to just charge ahead without thinking and then rationalize your behavior after the fact. Someone once said, "There is no right way to do a wrong thing".

Norman Vincent Peale in his book "Ethical Management" describes the tool that will help navigate the moral mud. It's called "The Ethics Check".

1. Is it legal?

Will I be violating civil law, our Post's code of ethics or standards of conduct?

(We should expect that all members will not undertake any activity that is or gives the appearance of being improper, illegal or immoral or that could in any way harm or embarrass our Post.)

2. Is it balanced?

Is it fair to all concerned in the short term as well as the long term? Does it promote win-win relationships? Has the action or inaction benefited one person at another person's real expense?

3. How will it make me feel about myself?

Will it make me proud? Would I feel good if it were published in the newspaper? Would I feel good if my family knew about it?

The legal question looks at existing standards, the balance question activates your sense of fairness and rationality and the last question focuses on your own standards of morality. If the answer to any of these questions is no, then search no further. Your ethical dilemma has been answered.

I hope that this will help answer how we should go about deciding what is ethical and what is not. Below is a code of ethics that I strongly recommend we follow. I use it for myself and my business.

Code of Ethics

We have the following primary moral obligations to the people we serve. Since rational people act knowingly and freely, violations of these obligations raise the presumption of a moral wrong.

- **1. Honesty:** Lying or misrepresentation is understood to be a deliberate attempt to mislead others.
- **2. Loyalty:** A person who has placed faith and loyalty in you is entitled to a comparative degree of faith and loyalty from you in return.
- **3. Fairness:** Treat others, as you would have them treat you in return. Justice seeks reciprocal action.
- **4. Promise Keeping:** The freedom to make promises comes with the obligation to keep them.

These duties bind the fabric of our civilization and make social life and personal relationships possible. They also reinforce commercial and business operations as well. When injustice rules relationships and harmful actions are the norm, social life and business relationships cannot survive.

Our Finances

The budget committee has submitted, and the membership has approved our 2018/2019 budget. The budget is conservative, but we will still need your participation in achieving our goals. Some highlights are:

Adoption of a plan to pay down the principle balance on the post mortgage thus ensuring that our post will pay less in interest and be debt free in the future.

Allocation of funds for the training of our bartenders and other volunteers on the operation of our AED (automatic electronic defibrillator). We will announce the date of the training when established.

Special attention has been given to the service officer, special veterans events, local charities, children and youth to be sure all were fully funded.



BOYS STATE

I attended Boys State as an embedded counselor this year. It was one of the best experiences of my military career and my career as a Legionnaire.

I arrived with another member of my recruiting team on 16 June 2018. Upon arrival, I was introduced to the other counselors and participated in a number of briefings pertaining to the code of conduct, internet policy, and other administrative functions. The schedule for the week was available digitally through a product called "Yapp", the IT guy, Brian Epstein, provided links to realtime maps and up to the minute agendas throughout the week.



We also received a briefing on background checks from New Jersey State Police Officer Adam Polhemus; those of us in the military were covered by our agency checks.

We linked up with our "city staff" later that afternoon; I have the benefit of working with Richard F. Kane, a staff member who had been attending Boys State for over 30 years. We also had three other Junior Assistants working

with us. After setting up our individual dorms, we met up for a social function for staff.

The week started on Sunday at 6 am and didn't stop until Friday. The pace of the schedule is very hectic; we had almost 900 boys in process on Sunday morning. They were then split into their cities, given their Boys State shirts, and began the program. Things started with city intros; after the staff and the 52 boys became acquainted, the boys had their first campaigns and elections (for the position of election ballot officer). They then began to elect ward leaders and the guidon bearer for the city.

The normal work day concluded with a retreat ceremony, where two boys played "retreat" and "to the colors" as the flag was lowered and presented to the Director of Operations, Chuck Smith. Each city lined up behind its mayor and guidon bearer and reported accountability to MAJ (Retired) Joe Demyon, the Dean of Americanism.

Between campaigns, elections, and meals, the boys attended career and college seminars, to include briefings regarding the service academies, the individual military services, applying to college, and working in the law enforcement industry. They also attendgeneral assemblies speakers like Brigadier General (Retired) John DiNapoli, Bill Spadea of NJ 101.5., and members of the New Jersey Assembly. More campaigns were held, first for city offices, then for county positions; boys campaigned to be judges, public defenders, and city council members.

Every day was full of campaigning and elections; every night ended with a general assembly. There were assemblies commemorating D-Day and demonstrating the skill of the Boys State band - a group of boys who

had never played together before that week.

In the afternoons, the boys engaged in county sports; they could choose between volleyball, football, and a number of other activities. During these periods, the boys also had the opportunity to do Physical Training with the Marine Corps or the Army National Guard; the Guard brought out a soccer inflatable and a rock wall.

The boys were also able to sign up for an off-campus trip to the New Jersey National Guard Militia Museum in Lawrenceville, NJ. At the conclusion of the museum tour, recruiters from the Lawrenceville Armory briefed the boys on the Reserve Officer Training Program.

On graduation day, the boys formed up on Daly field and were treated to demonstrations by the United States

and a static display of a Blackhawk Helicopter by the 1-150th Aviation Battalion of the New Jersey Army National Guard.

Upon graduation, the boys were presented with a diploma and with a Boys State pin.

Gold Star Mother's Day

Is observed on the last Sunday in September.



Each year on Gold Star Mother's Day the United States president calls on all Americans to display the nation's flag and hold appropriate meetings to publicly express their love, sorrow, and reverence towards Gold Star Mothers and their families.

The name the Gold Star Mothers was derived from the custom of military families who put a service flag near their front window. The flag featured a star for each family member serving their country-living members were denoted in blue but gold stars honored family members who were killed while on duty. In 1918 President Woodrow Wilson approved the wearing of black arm bands bearing a gilt star by those who had a family member who died in the military service to the United States. This distinguished them from the blue stars, representing a family member presently serving in the armed forces.

The last Sunday in September is also Parents of Fallen Military Sons and Daughters Day in New Jersey. This Day is a tribute to all parents whose children died as a result of their service with the United States Armed Forces. It commemorates the contributions, commitments and sacrifices made by these parents individually and through the American Gold Star Mothers.

American Gold Star Mothers was incorporated in 1929.


