American Legion Welcomes President's Signing of LEGION Act

(INDIANAPOLIS, July 30, 2019) -- The head of the nation's largest veteran's organization thanked President Trump for signing a bipartisan act which will recognize veterans who served during periods not previously considered "wartime."


The Let Everyone Get Involved in Opportunities for National Service Act {LEGION Act) opens the door for millions of veterans to access American Legion programs and benefits for which they previously had not been eligible

"We are grateful that President Trump fully acknowledges the importance of The American Legion by signing the LEGION Act in the White House today - just one week after it passed the House of Representatives," National Commander Brett P. Reistad said. "In an era of partisan gridlock, Republicans and Democrats in Congress overwhelmingly recognized the importance of allowing millions of honorable but previously ineligible veterans the right to join the largest and most influential veteran's organization in the country."

The gaps in the war eras were largely during the Cold War, a time when threats to U.S. national security was real, especially to the men and women serving in uniform. Overall, about 1,600 U.S. servicemembers were killed or wounded in hostile operations during periods that were not previously recognized as times of war by the federal government.

"Recognizing the service of these wartime veterans is the right thing do and it is long overdue," Reistad said. "The families of those who were killed or wounded during these wartime acts should take pride in knowing that we recognize their sacrifice and service. Moreover, we are proud to wel-

come any of the six million living veterans from the previously unrecognized periods into our organization and call them 'Legionnaires."


Reistad points out that existing American Legion membership applications are in the process of being updated but can still be used. "In the meantime, I recommend that prospective Legionnaires and recruiters 'LEGION Act' in the eligibility date section of American Legion membership applications if they fall outside the previous war eras," Reistad said. "The larger pool of veterans now eligible for The American Legion will also open their family members to eligibility in the Sons of the American Legion and

American Legion Auxiliary as well."

With a current membership of nearly two million wartime veterans, The American Legion was founded in 1919 on the four pillars of a strong national security, veterans' affairs, patriotic youth programs and Americanism. Legionnaires work for the betterment of their communities through nearly 13,000 posts worldwide. From the drafting of the original GI Bill to the creation of the Department of Veterans Affairs. The American Legion is the most influential voice for America's veterans. The American Legion, www.legion.org. will celebrating its centennial through Veterans Day.

SERVICE OFFICER REPORT

Brothers and sisters.

I am going to try and report monthly on some of the activities that the Post is involved with that is impacting our engagement with the community. We participate in many programs that quite frankly no one hears about and I believe we need to change the perception of who we are in the eyes of the community.

We participated in the memorial service at Locustwood Cemetery in Cherry Hill, the Locustwood Cemetery Association, 50+ years ago, donated a large portion of the cemetery to be for American Legion members free of charge. The agreement being that once a year we would hold a memorial service to acknowledge the Association.

We hosted a meeting of the Ocean County Military Support Committee, Veteran Subcommittee, to discuss the needs of Ocean County Veterans, homelessness, PTSD, Brick Clinic expansion, education, and suicide prevention.

We participated in the D-Day service at the Ocean County Court house at the invitation of the Toms River Historical Society.

At the State Convention, we participated in the presentation of the G.I. Bill exhibit.

We participated in the Vietnam memorial service in Wildwood at the Vietnam wall.

On Monday, June 17th I was



asked to officiate a funeral for a fallen Iraq vet at General Doyle cemetery, the minister failed to show.

As a board member of the Ocean County Military Support Committee I participated in a picnic at Lakehurst for the Naval air side of the base for the staff and their families.

I was a presenter at the One Stop Center on Hooper Avenue, talking about the Legion and what we do in the community.

I made a presentation to the Ocean County Shriners, talking about the Legion and what we do in the community.

As a Board Member I attended the monthly meeting of the Ocean County Military Support Committee

We participated in the High Point Memorial service and the rededication of the state park as High Point State Park and Veterans Memorial

We participated in the dedication of the new Post 107 in Hoboken

Five members of the Legion Riders and myself participated in a funeral escort for an abandoned veteran in Pennsylvania. A 237-mile ride in 102 temperatures.

We have installed a Community, Victory Garden, at the Post with the help of the Boy Scouts, Ocean County College, and the Fulfill food bank. This was done at no cost to the Post with a grant from the YMCA, and Rutgers University.

I met with representatives of the Harrogate Senior community to talk about the Legion and they have invited me to make a presentation to their community on November 12.

I attended a luncheon in Mt Holly introducing the new command staff at MDL

We had the dedication of the community Victory Garden. Many local and state dignitaries attended

At Ocean County College there is a new team whose primary

function is to make OCC a "VETERAN FRIENDLY COMMU-NITY", to that end we have been assisting the college in a number of areas. We have assisted in the operation of the campus food bank suppling food. Jersey Coast Appliance suppled two refrigerator freezers. We supplied a military services flag set for the new veteran lounge and have supplied memorabilia to decorate the lounge and veterans only conference room. Our new Adjutant donated a dorm room refrigerator freezer for the Veterans Lounge.

By the time this goes to print a number of us will have attended the 101st National Convention in Indianapolis.

As Service Officer I have been in contact with a number of veterans in distress, some we helped financially, some we helped by getting them in-touch with various other organizations who were able to help them with some special needs, I have also put a number of them in-touch with the Brick Clinic and the VA compensation offices in Toms River.

Congress passed a bill that the President signed into law changing the requirement dates for eligibility for the American legion. Now anyone who served one day of active duty and was honorability discharged can now be a legion member. No more "wartime" requirements, sign up a friend!

George P. Vanderveer Post 129 The American Legion 'Our Centennial Year'

In September 1919, First Lieutenant Clifford R. Powell, a Burlington County boy. Came through Toms River and, "stirred up the boys, just back from the war," To start up an American Legion Post.

"The boys just back from the war" took him seriously and about 25 veterans met at the Courthouse on October 21, 1919. The meeting was called to order and presided over by, Common Pleas Judge William Howard Jeffries. Assisted by Leo Babchin, American Legion County Chairman. Leroy Grant was appointed, temporary Secretary. Official elections were held and resulted in Carlton D. Elwell elected as Post Commander, Heulings A. Sever as Post Adjutant and Nelson A. Cowdrick to the position of Post Finance Officer. Yearly dues were set at \$1.50.

At the formal organizational meeting at the courthouse on the 27th, additional officers were elected. Vice Commander, Lester McCarthy, Historian, Wallace Havens and Charles Newman, Finance Officer. George Potter Vanderveer, was adopted as our namesake.

"George Potter Vanderveer, son of Capt. and Mrs. Charles Vanderveer of Bayville, who was returned from "Over There" sometime ago suffering from shell shock and gas is seriously ill at base hospital No. 4, Ft. Potter, N. Y. He was thought to be improv-

ing nicely when acute articular rheumatism set in. For many weeks his parents asked to be permitted to visit him, but this was denied them until last Wednesday evening, when Mr. Vanderveer received a telegram bidding him come. George was able to recognize his father for a few minutes at a time and talked of home and mother, but the doctors give but very little hope of his recovery. George was eighteen years old when he volunteered and served with Co. E 24th Engineers. He told his father he would be going back into the fight as soon as he got well and seemed very anxious to get over in France again. He is in a room by himself and has every attention and is a general favorite with doctor and nurses."

George Potter Vanderveer succumbed to his injuries and effects of gas on August 4, 1918. He is interred in the family plot at Riverside Cemetery with his Father George and Mother Euphenia.

After the war Clifford R. Powell was commissioned a First Lieutenant in the NJ National Guard, in 1919 after many promotions, was promoted to Major General, National Guard, commanding the 44th Division. He died on March 28, 1973.

These gardens produced up to 41% of all the vegetable produce that was consumed in the nation.




