COMMANDERS MESSAGE

At the completion of my last newsletter, as in previous newsletters, I often wonder, what will I ever write about in the next newsletter since it seems that I have covered all of the information about the Post that is fit to print. What else could I have to report? Well as it turns out, 2012 and Post 129 went out like a lion. October, November and December will be months we will not forget anytime soon.

Hurricane Sandy roared up the coast and into our community on October 29th Many of our members suffered devastating losses. Post 348 in Brick sustained extensive water damage and Post 351 in Seaside Heights had severe damage as well. The Legion Family throughout the county and state has pulled together not only to help their members but the community as well. Our Service Officer Mike Kelly whose home was virtually destroyed by the storm spent countless hours assisting our members with benefits and even finding time to be Santa for the children. Thanks Mike.

Post 129 had only minor damage and became a staging area to assist flood victims. The Red Cross designated our post as a comfort station, allowing us to serve meals and provide warmth to all those without heat and electricity. In addition to hundreds of local donations, trucks began to arrive from South Carolina, Missouri, and Michigan and even as far away as Oregon. I would like to thank Veteran Bob Marinkov from Lebanon, Pennsylvania who

drove his 40' trailer to our post at his expense. He brought along 8 volunteers to help unload the truck as well. He said he was just "paying it forward". Many of those items were donated by Holiday Inn. Best Western and Comfort Inns in Pennsylvania. They stayed long enough to unload the truck, have lunch and get back on the road for another load. Our downstairs meeting room was filled to capacity with everything from cleaning supplies, warm blankets. non-perishable foods, diapers and hygiene products. Thanks also to our members who formed the "Chain Gang" to assist with unloading the truck.

I would like to thank County Commander Ray Miller for helping to facilitate many of these events especially during my absence.

The Governor's office notified me of a second truck load coming from Sommerville, South Carolina's Fire Department to their sister Fire Company in Sommerville, New Jersey. They asked Post 129 to facilitate that delivery. Initially we planned on sending it to the Union Beach American Legion Post which was destroyed in the Hurricane, however, at the last minute it became necessary to rearrange that delivery to another location since Home Depot had donated sheet rock to Union Beach and they had no additional storage facility. Several telephone calls later, Toms River Emergency Management arranged for us to store that truckload in the Anchorage Plaza on Hooper Ave. The Calvary Baptist Church is operating a mobile kitchen there serving breakfast every day and distributing supplies to those in need.

Traditionally our Post is closed

on Thanksgiving Day; however we were approached by a nonprofit organization called Door 21 who had worked at the Pine Belt Arena Shelter along with the Red Cross. They asked if we could remain open on Thanksgiving and feed those displaced by the storm. Naturally we agreed and our banquet hall was packed for the day with volunteers and those with nowhere else to go. I want to make special mention of our kitchen staff for volunteering their time to assist.

On November 27th, our Post hosted a Hiring Our Heroes Job Fair. This event was run by the National Chamber of Commerce and the State American Legion in conjunction with many other organizations and vendors. This fair was geared toward employment for the trades, since the devastation along the shore would require more building trade's people than are presently available. The job fair was very successful and once again the Post received State and National recognition, being featured in the American Legion National Magazine. Since the inception of the American Legion Job Fairs, approximately 2000 veterans and their spouses have attended and approximately 250 Veterans or 13% have found employment.

Sadly, we also received word that Marine Cpl. Christopher Monahan of Island Heights, formerly of Ocean Gate and Beachwood, was killed in action in Afghanistan. As in the past, County Commander Ray Miller and I responded to the family home and met with Cpl. Monahan's parents and wife and three children. We asked for the

As you know the Riders as well as all members of the Post were affected by hurricane Sandy, some more than others. I was very lucky, having to deal only with the loss of power for eleven days. Members of our group lost a lot more; several lost their motorcycles, cars, furniture, heating systems, water heaters, and much more. Some had to leave their homes for long periods of time. This to me is when it is spe-

cial to belong to an organization like the American Legion. We cannot always help each member as much as we would like, but it does give you support of the many members we have. Just to have friends that can feel the hurt seems to help even if just a little. With Christmas and New Year coming it is hopeful that all of our American Legion families that have suffered these losses are on their way back to "normal".

Another difficult time for our Riders is the accident of our brother Bob Joerg. Bob was taking his Harley Davidson to Long Branch Harley when he had an accident coming off the Garden State Parkway. Bob suffered three broken bones in his left lea. broken clavicle, several broken ribs, collapsed lung, and a compression fracture to his lower back. He had emergency surgery to place 3 screws into his leg and a few days later surgery to repair the damage in his back. good news is that Bob is expected to make a complete recovery but at the cost of long rehabilitation. The Legion Riders will be having a spaghetti dinner in February to assist Bob in his long road to recovery.

Hopefully there is no other "bad" news to pass on in upcoming days. Hopefully the New Year brings better news than the way 2012 ended.

assist them in rebuilding their home damaged by Hurricane Sandy.


Thank you to Ron Cloos for organizing the SAL sponsored

On February 25, 1862, Congress passed the Legal Tender Act, authorizing the government to use paper notes to pay its bills. These notes were called greenbacks and were legal tender, meaning they had to be accepted at face value. This was the beginning of paper money in the United States.

FOUR CHAPLAINS

The Four Chaplains, also sometimes referred to as the "Immortal Chaplains," were four United States Army chaplains who gave their lives to save other civilian and military personnel during the sinking of the troop ship USAT Dorchester on February 3, 1946, during WWII. They helped other soldier's board lifeboats and gave up their own life jackets when the supply ran out. The chaplains joined arms, said prayers, and sang hymns as they went down with the ship. The four were relatively new chaplains, who all held the rank of first lieutenant. They included Methodist minister the Reverend George L. Fox, Rabbi Alexander D. Goode, Roman Catholic priest the Reverend John P. Washington, and Reformed Church in America minister the Reverend Clark V. Poling. Their backgrounds, personalities, and faiths were different, although Goode, Poling and Washington had all served as leaders in the Boy Scouts of America. They met at the Army Chaplains School at Harvard University, where they prepared for assignments in the European theater, sailing board USAT Dorchester to report to their new assignments.

George L. Fox

George L. Fox was born March 15, 1900 in Lewiston Pennsylvania. He lied about his age at 17 and joined the Army to serve in World War I. He joined the ambulance corps in 1917. As a medical corps assistant he was highly decorated for bravery and was awarded the Silver Star, Purple Heart and the French Croix de Guerre. Upon his discharge he returned home, finished high school and entered Moody Bible Institute in 1923. He later graduat-

ed from Illinois Wesleyan University. He studied at Boston University of Theology and was ordained a Methodist Minister in 1934. George served as state chaplain and historian for the American Legion in Vermont. In 1942, Fox volunteered to serve as a US Army chaplain. In 1942 he was united with Chaplains Goode, Poling and Washington at Camp Myles Standish in Taunton Massachusetts where they prepared to depart for Europe on board the USAT *Dorchester*.

Alexander D. Goode

Rabbi Alexander D. Goode was born in Brooklyn New York, on May 10, 1911. He followed in his father's footsteps by studying for the rabbinate at Hebrew Union College, graduating with a B.H. degree in 1937. He later received his Ph.D. from Johns Hopkins University in 1940. He originally applied to become a Navy chaplain but was not accepted. After Pearl Harbor he applied to the US Army to serve as a chaplain and was accepted and assigned to the 333rd Airbase Squadron in North Carolina. In October 1942, he was transferred to Taunton, Massachusetts and reunited with chaplains Fox, Poling and Washington who were classmates at the US Army Chaplains School at Harvard University.

Clark V. Poling

Clark V. Poling was born August 7, 1910 in Columbus, Ohio. Clark studied at Yale and University's Divinity School in New Haven Connecticut and graduated with a B.D. degree in 1936. He was ordained in the Reformed Church in America and served in the First Church of Christ, New London, Connecticut. With the outbreak of WWII, Poling decided to enter the Army. His father, who had served as a WWII chaplain, told him

chaplains risk and give their lives too—and with that knowledge he applied to serve as an Army chaplain, accepting his appointment on June 10, 1942 as chaplain with the 131st Quartermaster Truck Regiment, Camp Shelby, Mississippi. Later he reported to the US Army Chaplains School at Harvard University where he would meet with chaplains Fox, Goode and Washington.

John P. Washington

John was born in Newark, NJ, on July 18, 1908. He completed his high school and college courses at Seton Hall, in South Orange to prepare for the Catholic priesthood. He graduated in 1931 with an A.B. degree, entering Immaculate Conception Seminary in Darlington, NJ, where he received his minor orders on May 26, 1933. He served as sub deacon and later became a deacon in 1934. He was elected prefect of his class and was ordained a priest on June 15, 1935. Father Washington's first parish was at St. Genevieve's in Elizabeth, NJ. Shortly after the Pearl Harbor attack he received his appointment at a chaplain in the US Army, reporting for active duty May 9, 1942. He was Chief of the chaplains reserve pool at Fort Benjamin Harrison, IN and in June was assigned to the 76th infantry Division in Ft. Meade, MD. In November 1942 he reported to Taunton, Massachusetts and met Chaplains Fox, Goode and Poling at Chaplains School at Harvard.

On 28 January 1915 President Woodrow Wilson signed into law the "Act to Create the Coast Guard," an act passed by Congress on 20 January, 1915 that combined the Life-Saving Service and Revenue Cutter Service to form the Coast Guard.



Boy Scouts Day

The Boy Scouts of America was founded on February 8, 1910. An outdoor field manual, Scouting for Boys, was published by Robert Baden-Powell on January 24, 1908. This was the beginning of the Boy Scouts, an international movement with the goal of teaching good citizenship to boys.
