COMMANDERS MESSAGE

Well, the time has come. This will be my last Commanders Message as I pass the gavel. I must admit, it is a bittersweet moment. Finishing my fourth year as Commander has brought much change. I have been very fortunate to have a hard working, dedicated executive board who consistently saw the "light at the end of the tunnel". This has never been a one-man operation. Maintaining the Post and its grounds is a monumental task. We have also renovated the downstairs, so that it can be used as an additional meeting room, office and storage. We have a new Internet Jukebox, ATM machine and a new Pull Tab machine as well. All of these machines generate revenue for our post.

The picnic grove has been upgraded. New natural gas BBQ's have been built and installed.

Walkways were put in place so that our handicapped folks could get down to the bunker bar. Speaking of the bunker bar, it too was updated. We have Direct TV and Sirius Radio (Yes, you will be able to watch the Yankee games). We have a new soda system which we acquired at no cost to us from Coca-Cola at our Bunker Bar, Canteen Bar as well as our Service Bar. We've added stage this year. Two Boy Scouts completed their Eagle Scout projects by designing, purchasing and building new picnic tables, including some that are wheelchair accessible. A new project is in the works and will make its debut for Memorial Day weekend. I also want to thank the Department of Corrections for providing manpower for our many projects.

We have a pool league, shuffle-board, darts, horseshoes and bocce as well as a children's playground. We have acquired the 1953 Shore Patrol jeep from the Tin Can Sailors and have restored a 1918 Cannon named Phenia. Both of these nostalgic pieces are utilized in the various

parades. Our live entertainment continues to be a big draw in the canteen every Friday and Saturday night. Be sure to check the entertainment schedule either in the lobby, on our webpage or Facebook page. Speaking of the lobby, please continue to bring non-perishable food into the post and place it in the box located in the lobby. This food is being distributed to both Vetwork and the food pantry here in Toms River. Watch for the grand opening of the new pantry located on Hooper Avenue this summer. "Remember -Life is a balance".

Thank you to Frank McArdle for his dedicated help in arranging the hotels for the Wildwood Convention. This is a thankless job that requires being very detail oriented. I should note that once again we are sold out. Feel free to come down for the day and join us in the parade on Saturday.

We have hired a part time bookkeeper and our entire system has been updated and computerized. We now have a






